What is Growing Season?

Growing Season is a farm-based summer learning program for 5th-8th grade students. Farm-based education connects youth to agriculture, community, and the environment, through hands-on authentic and experiential learning.



Students choose from a menu of daily activities based on their own unique interests, as they relate to food and farming, such as:

- Animal care
- Gardening
- Cooking with farm produce
- Journaling
- Agriculture art projects, such as beeswax candles and tea
- Farm stand management



Where is Growing Season?



In its second year, *Growing Season* is a program under the umbrella of College of the Atlantic (COA) and is located at COA's Peggy Rockefeller Farms in Bar Harbor, 4.7 miles from the college campus.

The farm currently includes:

- Vegetable gardens
- Fruit trees
- Raspberry patch
- Forest
- Pastures
- Cattle
- Sheep and lambs
- Chickens and chicks



...and of course barn cats and a farm dog!

Why Growing Season?

Offered as a two-week enrichment program, the curriculum is interdisciplinary and is aligned with national and state learning standards, with a special focus on environmental science and English Language Arts.



Through exploration on an organic farm, *Growing Season* promotes:

- Active participation in authentic learning experiences, leading to greater enthusiasm, increased selfesteem, and academic achievement.
- Reading, writing, and creativity
- Entrepreneurship and leadership
- Collaboration and teamwork
- Environmental responsibility
- Healthy food choices


